

## Proclamation

## By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, the United States isolation from World War II ended on December 7, 1941, when the Empire of Japan executed a surprise attack on American military instillations in the Pacific; and

WHEREAS, on December 11, 1941, Germany and Italy, in solidarity with Japan, declared war on the United States; and

WHEREAS, over the course of the next four years, the United States fought vigilantly on two distant and very different fronts, Europe and the Pacific; and

WHEREAS, in March of 1941, the United States and Great Britain embarked upon what would be known as the "Europe First" strategy, which asserted that the two countries would concentrate their resources in order to defeat Nazi Germany in Europe first; and

WHEREAS, in 1943, the United States, along with Great Britain and other Allied forces, participated in the invasion of Sicily and Italy, marking the first major European theater operation in which the United States deployed a substantial contingent of troops on the ground; and

WHEREAS, from 1943 to 1945, the United States played a pivotal role in many of the largest and most important battles of the War in Europe, such as the invasion of Normandy, the Battle of the Bulge and the eventual Allied invasion of Germany on March 22, 1945; and

WHEREAS, on May 7, 1945, Nazi Germany unconditionally surrendered to Allied forces, thus ending World War II in Europe;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim May 8, 2020, as

## Victory in Europe Day

in the state of Alabama.
