By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, polycystic kidney disease (PKD) is a progressive, genetic disorder that causes damage to the kidneys and the cardiovascular, endocrine, hepatic and gastrointestinal organ systems; and

WHEREAS, PKD causes kidney function decline and is one of the four leading causes of kidney failure in the United States; and

WHEREAS, people who have chronic, life-threatening diseases like PKD have a predisposition to depression and its resultant consequences of seven times the national average because of their anxiety over pain, suffering and premature death; and

WHEREAS, PKD has a devastating impact on the health and finances of people of all ages, and equally affects people of all races, genders, nationalities, geographic locations and income levels; and

WHEREAS, PKD awareness empowers patients and families to seek diagnosis, support and appropriate treatment;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim September 2020, as

Polycystic Kidney Disease Awareness Month
