

Proclamation

By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, Marfan syndrome is a life-threatening genetic connective tissue condition that can involve many parts of the body including the heart and blood vessels, eyes, bones and joints, and lungs demonstrated by varying degrees of disability, pain, muscular skeletal issues, often resulting in a lifelong series of multi-system health-related maladies; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that 1 in 5,000 individuals worldwide are born with Marfan syndrome, regardless of race, gender and ethnicity; and

WHEREAS, the number and severity of symptoms associated with Marfan syndrome differ greatly among individuals; and

WHEREAS, all expressions of Marfan syndrome are life-long, incurable, and potentially debilitating; and

WHEREAS, because it is a life-threatening genetic condition, timely diagnosis and treatment is essential; and

WHEREAS, through public awareness, the State of Alabama seeks to raise awareness of Marfan syndrome in order to properly diagnose and treat individuals affected by this condition;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim February 2021, as

Marfan Syndrome Awareness Month
