

Proclamation

By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, in September of 1940, President Franklin Roosevelt announced that the U.S. Army Air Corps (AAC), a precursor of the U.S. Air Force, would begin training African American pilots; and

WHEREAS, Tuskegee Army Airfield in Tuskegee, Alabama, was chosen as the training site for the 99th Pursuit Squadron, later known as the Tuskegee Airmen; and

WHEREAS, the program's trainees, nearly all of which were college graduates or undergraduates, came from all corners of the United States; and

WHEREAS, in addition to some 1,000 pilots, the Tuskegee program trained nearly 14,000 navigators, bombardiers, instructors, aircraft and engine mechanics, control tower operators and other maintenance and support staff; and

WHEREAS, in April of 1942, the Tuskegee- trained 99th Pursuit Squadron deployed to North Africa, where they flew missions in second-hand P-40 planes, which were slower and more difficult to maneuver than that of their German adversaries; and

WHEREAS, in February of 1944, the 100th, 301st and 302nd fighter squadrons arrived in Italy and joined the 99th Pursuit Squadron to form the new 332nd Fighter Group; and

WHEREAS, by the time the 332nd flew its last combat mission on April 26, 1945, the Tuskegee Airmen had flown more than 15,000 individual sorties over two years in combat; and

WHEREAS, throughout this time, they had destroyed or damaged 36 German planes in the air and 237 on the ground, as well as nearly 1,000 rail cars and transport vehicles and a German destroyer; and

WHEREAS, the Tuskegee Airmen played a substantial role in the desegregation of the U.S. Armed Forces by proving African Americans had no shortage of intelligence, skill, courage or patriotism for such an endeavor;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim March 7, 2022, as

Tuskęgee Airmen Day

in the state of Alabama.
