

## Proclamation

## By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, with over 100 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs) around the nation, HBCUs have had an invaluable impact to strengthen communities by serving as economic hubs in their respective regions, generating more than 130,000 jobs for their local and regional economies and producing more than 50,000 graduates each year; and

WHEREAS, with a total of 14 institutions, Alabama has the largest number of HBCUs in the nation that provide exceptional educational opportunities to improve the lives of Alabamians every year. Not only do HBCUs represent historical and economic significance in the state, but they also serve the unique purpose of providing access to top educational opportunities to a large number of African American students; and

WHEREAS, through the HBCU Initiative, the Alabama Office of Minority Affairs is focused on policies and programs to maximize the economic impact of these institutions to ensure the viability and sustainability of HBCUs in the state; and

WHEREAS, The Alabama HBCU Co-Op Program, created under the Alabama Office of Minority Affairs' HBCU initiative, was established under my administration's Strong Start, Strong Finish initiative to establish a pipeline of diverse talent to join Alabama's workforce; and

WHEREAS, HBCUs are well known for preparing the highest number of African-American students for science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields, and many of Alabama's HBCUs have been recognized for their top performing STEM departments and programs; and

WHEREAS, HBCV Week promotes higher education through increased public awareness of the celebration of the tremendous economic, cultural and social impact of HBCVs in our state;
